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Music Notes

A music report during the time of the coronavirus pandemic feels a bit strange, doesn't it? New understanding of the virus shows that singing produces aerosols that carry the virus and can linger in the air for an hour or more and travel further than six feet. With this information, it is clear that communal singing in the church will not return to our experience for a while and for good reason. But after a few weeks of services with instrumental music and no voices, I have realized that this worship just isn't the same as when all our voices could join together. Congregational singing brings so much to our experience of God during a service, but what is it and why doesn't instrumental music do the same?

To explore this question, I turned to a book on my shelf called *Church Musicians: Reflections on Their Call, Craft, History, and Challenges* by Paul Westermeyer (2015). Westermeyer is a former ELCA pastor, musician, and professor, who most recently served at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN. He writes:

To be human is to sing, and to sing around Word, Font, and Table is *to be*. The Congregation's singing therefore is no trivial pursuit. It is about essential matters. The congregation's singing is fun, or, perhaps, better, delightful play, just like all musicmaking. But it is not a mindless or entertaining diversion that gives the church a break from the really important stuff or serves as a manipulatively attractive ploy. It is the sounding

form of the body of Christ, with its own discipline and integrity, gathered and refined from the riches of the church's practice over centuries, and laced with new things to be tried. It is not the easy superficiality to which the church is tempted and which the skeptics rightly deride. It is the communal doxology and edification that arise partly through the quotidian, but also through the struggle with pain, doubt, despair, and sadness and through the exultation of joy, hope, healing, and new life. It comes from the tedious and delightful daily round, as well as from grappling with the faith and with God when God seems both absent and present. These are no small matters. They are what the church's song is about and lie buried beneath it like "grain that sleeps unseen." The church's song is as important as all the other things to which the church is called and gathers an unusually large number of connections. It deserves the careful thought...and the intentional practice a faithful church is called to embody. (p. 18)

So even though we cannot raise our voices while gathered together at this time, we can sing psalms and hymns in the comfort of our home and know that we are still human and still praising God. While gathered together for worship, we can listen to the familiar melodies and reacquaint ourselves with the texts that connect us to the "riches of the church's practice over centuries".
